OBITUARY

NATALIE JAFFE (1943-2023)



ast year I celebrated 50 years in this wonderful business. During that time I have had the privilege of working with some of the legends in commercial numismatics: William French, Douglas Liddell, Peter Mitchell, Geoffrey Hearn, Margaret Amstell, Patrick Finn, Paul Divo, Michael Sharp, to name just a few. But my 51st year has marked an end of an era for me and many others with passing of Natalie Jaffe, our much-loved and respected South African representative.

Natalie Carol Jaffe was thrown into numismatics by the untimely death of her husband, Allen Jaffe, who had founded City Coins in Cape Town in 1967 and who died tragically in a boating accident in Cape Town harbour in May 1975. Natalie was expecting their third child (Allen) and with their two very young children, Joseph and Sharon, the family had been due to emigrate to the United States 10 days later. Instead, Natalie was faced with the task of running City Coins with no previous business or numismatic knowledge, while bringing up three children on her own. With her typical strength of character and determined resolve, and the help of several good friends including 'Bill' Hibbard, Glen Schoeman, Dr Frank Mitchell and his son Rob, she grew City Coins into an internationally-recognised

numismatic business. City Coins was the most respected auction house in South Africa for war medals and decorations, holding 73 sales of items from most of the principal collectors in the country.

Our fortunate collaboration with her and her company began in 2003, at first with modest consignments from her clients, then expanding to full single-owner auctions. Without doubt she made an important contribution to the Coin Department's growth and helped to make it what is it today.

Natalie loved life. She loved to entertain, she loved London, she loved a glass of champagne and would send it back if the bottle had been opened for too long and the bubbles did not rise fast enough! She was generous with her time, advice and compassion. Her incredible sense of humour, even at the very end of her long illness, was an inspiration to us all. She was a mother to three fantastic children who blessed her with seven grandchildren. And she was a friend for life.

On 18 January 2023 we lost a numismatic legend and friend who can never be replaced.

FOREWORD

THE HAZELBURY CIVIL WAR HOARD OF ENGLISH GOLD COINS





Lot 13

Presented here for sale is a hoard of English gold coins of James I (1603–25) and Charles I (1625–49), discovered in the grounds of the historic Hazelbury Manor near the small village of Box in Wiltshire in August 2020 (PAS WILT-0CB2A3).

The fourteen gold coins were retrieved over the course of two days by Steve Simmons, an employee at the manor who had been granted permission to detect the land by its current owners. Tightly clustered together at a range of depths between six and twelve inches, the coins represent a single deposit.

One of the coins (lot 13) has several small peripheral adhesions across its surfaces, which represent the remnants of the leather purse or pouch in which the coins were contained. Mr Simmons was, at this point, a relative newcomer to the hobby of metal detecting, having begun to search the Manor grounds just two months prior to the hoard's discovery. Remarkably, the hoard was his first numismatic find of any kind.

Hazelbury Manor was founded in the fourteenth century, although activity in the area appears to

well pre-date this. Mr Simmons' activities have revealed a wide range of pre-medieval artefacts from the area, indicating rather intense and continuous occupation of the site from the Iron Age to the early Medieval period. Antiquarian

reports indicate the presence of a Roman Villa on the site. Although recent archaeological excavations were unable to validate this, the prevalence of related small finds discovered by Mr Simmons, including Roman brooches and coins, suggests that these reports may well be accurate after all. The Manor passed through various families in the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries, receiving numerous architectural adjustments, and in 1575 a royal visit, along the way. From 1602 until 1682 the estate became the property of the Speke family, being possessed during the Civil War period by George Speke (1598–1656), whose wife and daughter were recusants.

The deposition of the Hazelbury Manor hoard has been dated to c.1643, and this agrees with the freshness of its two most recent additions (lots 13-14) and the lack of any coins carrying mint marks from after this period. While hoards from the Civil War period have been discovered in significant numbers, it is most unusual to find an assemblage consisting entirely of gold coins, and the Hazelbury Manor find is significant in this regard. The location of its deposition is also notable; at a crossroads along the ancient Wyres Lane (running from Hazelbury Manor to Box Mill), placed precisely eight feet away from two perpendicular sections of medieval wall. This placement of the hoard appears deliberate and was presumably intended as an aid to its recovery, while the distance between the find-spot and the Manor argues against it being an occupant of the house that deposited the coins. We have then an unusual hoard deposited in the grounds of Hazelbury Manor by a presumably transient figure who intended to recover it, but was unable to do so.

In early July 1643 Lord Hopton led a Royalist army north toward Bath, securing first the bridge at Bradford-on-Avon, passing Claverton, progressing to Batheaston and finally facing Parliamentary forces at Landowne Hill on the 5th. The battle resulted in a defeat for Hopton; he was prevented from taking Bath with his cavalry routed and scattered. The following day Lord Hopton's army retreated to Devizes. Unfortunately, it is impossible to know for certain if the events at Landowne Hill have any relation to the deposition of the Hazelbury Manor hoard.

All we can say is that given the close proximity of Hazelbury Manor to the battle site, its significance in the local landscape and the apparent chronological alignment between the hoard's deposition and Lord Hopton's movements towards Bath, such a relationship is certainly plausible. If this is indeed the case, it may explain why the original owner did not retrieve their coins; they either fell atop Landowne Hill or were caught up in the ensuing retreat, without opportunity to retrace their steps along Wyres Lane.

FOREWORD

MARTYN HARDMAN GREEN (1942-2020)



artyn (definitely with a 'y' and not an 'i' - he was very proud of the 'y'), was a man with an insatiable thirst for knowledge.

Qualifying at St Bede in Durham, his original career path was that of a schoolmaster. In mid-life, ill health forced early retirement and from that point on, he had the time and flexibility to pursue his many interests.

He had always had a great interest in philately and, once retired, set up Hardman Green Philatelics in Darlington. This became a popular meeting point for stamp collectors from across the region and Martyn was in his element - often found behind his counter with an audience for his many anecdotes, thoughts and general musings! A wider audience beckoned when he was one of the first to set up and run an eBay shop - technology met tradition!

In his spare time he cast his net wider - interests such as orchids saw him as one of the co-founders of the Darlington Orchid Society and access to the world wide web meant that he could research and expand his knowledge on areas of interest such as the American Civil War, the World Wars and Britain's involvement in India (where his father had served prior to being ordained) and South Africa.

His initial ties to Durham remained a constant (whilst a student in the city he had conducted Cathedral tours) and when he closed his business, his focus turned to numismatics. Initially having a broad interest this eventually became more focused on the coins of the Durham Mint.

Which brings us to today and his collection -Martyn got a huge amount of pleasure from his collection - finding, identifying, learning and sharing his accumulated knowledge with others.

Although, as a family, we find it sad that the collection will no longer remain as a whole, we take pleasure in the hope that a tiny part of his endeavours will go to complete or enhance the collections of others.

Above all he was a family man - he leaves behind a wife he adored, a daughter to whom he meant the whole world and a son-in-law to whom he was the father he had always hoped for.

English gold coins of the seventh century remain remarkably scarce. Despite the efforts of metal detectorists, it is becoming increasingly clear that few will ever be found, and this holds particularly true in the case of the East Anglian 'Trophy' series. Around two dozen specimens have been recorded, struck from just five obverse dies. Clearly this was not a large-scale operation, and it did not produce a currency suited for significant circulation.

Unusually for this period, the obverse designs employed for the 'Trophy' series are not derived from Roman prototypes. Rather, these are original compositions of the mid to late seventh century, presumably imbued with significance recognisable to contemporaries. The design carried on the specimen offered for sale here represents an intriguing variation on the normal arrangement. While the diademed and cuirassed bust remains much the same, the orientation has been reversed, and the cross and hand motif seen on substantive 'Trophy' series is replaced with something altogether different. Here, a large floating cross occupies the upper part of the field below which is a star-shaped motif, with two of the radiate limbs terminating in rings, with another free-floating limb terminating in a ring directly underneath.

Given its unusual and deliberately Christian iconography, Metcalf felt able to relate the substantive 'Trophy' series (with its cross and hand motif) to a specific event. An account of the consecration of Medeshamstede Abbey (Peterborough) in the mid 660s records that witnesses, including king Wulfhere, attested the charter 'with their finger on Christ's cross', and it is to this episode that the 'Trophy' series has been attributed. However, such an arrangement does not sit comfortably with the known find-spots for the issue, which instead indicate a pattern of circulation around coastal East Anglia with a particular cluster in the proximity of Ipswich, and allows little room for explaining the star and ring variants.

On the reverse our coin carries the eponymous trophy scene adapted, like many of the numismatic motifs from this period, from a coin of the late Roman Empire. However, once again there is a dramatic departure from the arrangement seen within the substantive part of the 'Trophy' issue; the ordinary Latin legend has been replaced by runic script, a feature known from only one other true specimen (now housed in the Fitzwilliam Museum) and a contemporary plated forgery. Unfortunately, this runic legend has posed difficulties, and its meaning remains unexplained. Nevertheless, the very use of a runic legend is intriguing and may well demonstrate a desire amongst the elite of East Anglia to embrace their pre-Christian, and pre-Latin, traditions. Recognition of this prompts a possible explanation for the enigmatic star and ring motif seen before the bust on our coin. As Marsden notes, 'The annulets could well represent rings. The bestowing of rings by lords to their sworn followers was a feature of Anglo-Saxon society and is reflected in the heroic poetry of the age'...'If - as seems likely - the portraits represent the king of East Anglia, then they mark him out as both a Christian lord and perhaps also a ring-giver in the tradition of his ancestors'.

Offered here for sale is a highly unusual Halfgroat of Henry VII, produced at York under the authority of of Archbishop Savage (1501-7). The obverse carries a facing bust and the name of the reigning monarch. There are two main identifying marks which facilitate the mint attribution; St Peter's keys beside the neck (the left key being somewhat blundered), and the mint mark martlet. The obverse lettering series is F, and the die can be assigned to Winstanley's type 2, which he makes current around 1503. Notably, the obverse die used to strike our coin is also known to have been muled with reverse dies from Winstanley's type 6 (SCBI Ashmolean 672-3), the last of the facing bust issues from York, which continued until around 1504.

Quite surprisingly, the reverse of our coin belongs to the succeeding Profile issue, introduced in 1504 and produced for a while alongside the old full-faced coiange, before becoming the sole coinage. Its design is markedly distinct from that employed on the full-faced coiange, doing away with the 'cross and pellets' arrangement which had been the standard design for English silver coins since the fourteenth century. Instead, the reverse of the Profile issue comprises a single band of circumscript legend around a quartered shield of arms set over a long cross. During this period three mints were in operation; London, Canterbury and York. Mint mark martlet, as appears on the reverse, was seemingly employed at both Canterbury and York, an arrangement which has caused some confusion of attribution. According to the scheme set out first by Carlyon-Britton, adjusted by Winstanley and reinforced by Lord Setwartby, the Profile issue Halfgroats of Canterbury can be distinguished from those pieces of York on account of various other elements of design. The reverse of the coin under consideration here has three characteristics worthy of note; it lacks keys in the field beneath the shield; it utilises the spelling AVDIVTOREV as opposed to the usual AVDIVTORE; and finally, the A in AVDIVTOREV is barred and ornamental in shape. All three elements suggest that the reverse die used to strike this mule belongs to the group ordinarily associated with Canterbury.

If before Noonans remit the 'sale proceeds' to the seller, the buyer makes a claim to rescind the sale that is appropriate and Noonans is of the opinion that the claim is justified, Noonans is authorised to rescind the sale and refund to the buyer any amount paid to Noonans in respect of the lot.

18 Payment of sale proceeds

Noonans shall remit the 'sale proceeds' to the seller 35 days after the auction, but if by that date Noonans has not received the 'total amount due' from the buyer then Noonans will remit the sale proceeds within five working days after the date on which the 'total amount due' is received from the buyer. If credit terms have been agreed between Noonans and the buyer, Noonans shall remit to the seller the sale proceeds 35 days after the auction unless otherwise agreed by the seller.

19 If the buyer fails to pay to Noonans the 'total amount due' within 35 days after the auction, Noonans will endeavour to notify the seller and

take the seller's instructions as to the appropriate course of action and, so far as in Noonans' opinion is practicable, will assist the seller to recover the 'total amount due' from the buyer. If circumstances do not permit Noonans to take instructions from the seller, the seller authorises Noonans at the seller's expense to agree special terms for payment of the 'total amount due', to remove, store and insure the lot sold, to settle claims made by or against the buyer on such terms as Noonans shall in its absolute discretion think fit, to take such steps as are necessary to collect monies due by the buyer to the seller and if necessary to rescind the sale and refund money to the buyer if appropriate.

20 If, notwithstanding that, the buyer fails to pay to Noonans the 'total amount due' within 35 days after the auction and Noonans remits the 'sale proceeds' to the seller, the ownership of the lot shall pass to Noonans.

21 Charges for withdrawn lots

Where a seller cancels instructions for sale, Noonans reserve the right to charge a fee of 15% of Noonans' then latest middle estimate of the auction price of the property withdrawn, together with Value Added Tax thereon if the seller is resident in the UK, and 'expenses' incurred in relation to the property.

22 Rights to photographs and illustrations

The seller gives Noonans full and absolute right to photograph and illustrate any lot placed in its hands for sale and to use such photographs and illustrations and any photographs and illustrations provided by the seller at any time at its absolute discretion (whether or not in connection with the auction).

23 Unsold lots

24 Noonans reserve the right to charge commission up to one-half of the 'stated rates' calculated on the 'bought-in price' and in addition 'expenses' in respect of any unsold lots.

25 Noonans sells as agent for the seller (except where it is stated wholly or partly to own any lot as principal) and as such is not responsible for any default by seller or buyer.

26 Any representation or statement by Noonans, in any catalogue as to authorship, attribution, genuineness, origin, date, age, provenance, condition or estimated selling price is a statement of opinion only. Every person interested should exercise and rely on his or her own judgement as to such matters and neither Noonans nor its servants or agents are responsible for the correctness of such opinions.

27 Whilst the interests of prospective buyers are best served by attendance at the auction, Noonans will, if so instructed, execute bids on their behalf. Neither Noonans nor its servants or agents are responsible for any neglect or default in doing so or for failing to do so.

28 Noonans shall have the right, at its discretion, to refuse admission to its premises or attendance

at its auctions by any person.

29 Noonans has absolute discretion without giving any reason to refuse any bid, to divide any lot, to combine any two or more lots, to withdraw any lot from the auction and in case of dispute to put up any lot for auction again.

30 (a) Any indemnity under these Conditions shall extend to all actions, proceedings costs, expenses, claims and demands whatever incurred or suffered by the person entitled to the benefit of the indemnity.
(b) Noonans declares itself to be a trustee for its relevant servants and agents of the benefit of every indemnity under these Conditions to the extent that such indemnity is expressed to be for the benefit of its servants and agents.

31 Any notice by Noonans to a seller, consignor, prospective bidder or buyer may be given by first class mail, airmail or email and if so given shall be deemed to have been duly received by the addressee within 48 hours.

32 These Conditions shall be governed by and construed in accordance with English law. All transactions to which these Conditions apply and all matters connected therewith shall also be governed by English law. Noonans hereby submits to the exclusive jurisdiction of the English courts and all other parties concerned hereby submit to the non-exclusive jurisdiction of the English courts.

33 In these Conditions:

(a) 'catalogue' includes any advertisement, brochure, estimate, price list or other publication;
(b) 'hammer price' means the price at which a lot is knocked down by the auctioneer to the buyer;
(c) 'total amount due' means the 'hammer price' in respect of the lot sold together with any premium, Value Added Tax chargeable and additional charges and expenses due from a defaulting buyer in pounds sterling;

(d) 'deliberate forgery' means an imitation made with the intention of deceiving as to authorship, origin, date, age, period, culture or source which is not shown to be such in the description in the catalogue and which at the date of the sale had a value materially less than it would have had if it had been in accordance with that description;
(e) 'sale proceeds' means the net amount due to the seller being the 'hammer price' of the lot sold less commission at the 'stated rates' and 'expenses' and any other amounts due to Noonans by the seller in whatever capacity and howsoever arising;
(f) 'stated rate' means Noonans' published rates of commission for the time and any Value Added Tax thereon;
